SIW projects in short

SIW Internationale Vrijwilligersprojecten (SIW International Volunteer Projects) is a Dutch nongovernmental, non-profit voluntary service organisation that was founded in 1953. Every year, SIW sends approximately 175 volunteers to foreign sister-organisations in Europe, North America, Asia, Latin America and Africa; in total about 120 organisations in more than 70 countries. These volunteers can choose between voluntary workcamp projects (2 weeks) in international groups and Mid-Long Term Volunteering (projects that last 3 weeks to 12 months.

SIW is also a host and supporting organization for the European Solidarity Corps (ESC). Candidates from ESC program countries can apply and the period of volunteering is up to one year. For further information, please contact our office.

In 2020 SIW organises five international volunteer projects in the Netherlands. These take place in summer and last for two weeks (short-term projects). These are all Short-Term Volunteering projects (STV). At the moment SIW does not organize Mid-Long Term Volunteering projects or Long Term Volunteering (LTV) in the Netherlands for international volunteers. We organise these work camps in cooperation with Dutch social organisations such as the Dutch State Forestry, Emmaus (international charitable movement to combat poverty and homelessness) and the Central Agency for Refugees and Asylum Seekers. In the past years SIW has welcomed up to 100 volunteers from all over the world.

The mission of SIW is to stimulate people to broaden their horizon. This is achieved by bringing volunteers into contact with different cultures. This way, SIW wants to facilitate international contact and understanding, contribute to the personal growth and development of young people and encourage them to carry out social, cultural and environmental work. That work is offered in our projects in the Netherlands and in the projects organised by partners from our network abroad.

In 2020 SIW has two paid part-time office employees. In addition we have many volunteers, who help us organize inspiring projects in the Netherlands. Thanks to the current total of 70 volunteers in our organization, SIW is able to serve volunteers from all over the world!

All of our projects are put together and created in our little office in the centre of Utrecht, a city in the centre of the Netherlands, and supervised by an active and involved unpaid board, consisting of eight members.

SIW's income largely consists of contributions and subscription fees from the project participants, and funds for projects in the Netherlands. These grants come from different sources. The organisation does not receive any regular grants.

For the four projects focussing on those of 18+ years an application has been made for European Volunteering Teams under the Erasmus+ programme of the European Union. As a result these projects will only be open for subscription when the result of the application is known. This is expected by mid-April. If successful, there will not be a requirement for an extra local fee and travel costs for European participants (and from some neighbouring countries) will be reimbursed.

The fifth project (Zonnehoeve Zeewolde) focuses specifically on teenagers in the age of 15-17 years.

We encourage people with fewer opportunities to join our projects. Special support is available if needed but should be requested in advance.

General conditions for participants

Age limit: 18+, except for the project Zonnehoeve Zeewolde (where it is 15-17 years). For the latter project parental consent is required.

Common language used in the camps: English. Volunteers must be able to speak at least basic English. For some of the projects, at least an intermediate level in English language is required.

Maximum volunteers per country: there will be a maximum of 2 volunteers per nationality in order to have an intercultural group.

Insurance: SIW insurance covers the liability for inflicted damages to/by volunteers who participate in our projects. *This is only the case when personal insurances don't cover the costs*. Please note that private liability, medical costs and theft of personal property are not covered. Therefore, all participants are <u>obliged</u> to make their own arrangements for travel insurance and for manual volunteer work covering medical insurance and private liability and bring proof of this insurance. We recommend 'World Nomads Travel Insurance (Explorer plan)' or 'Gouda Isis Incoming Travel Insurance' (please contact SIW when interested in the 'Gouda' insurance, at least two weeks before departure).

Application and selection: SIW starts placing volunteers on <u>12 March 2020</u> on a first come first serve basis for the Zonnehoeve Zeewolde project. For the other projects this will take place on <u>16</u> <u>April 2020</u>. Please make sure that you submit all necessary documents. Volunteers from Europe need to show proof of payment of the participation fee (see below). For some projects a motivation letter or certificate of conduct is required (see below). For the Zonnehoeve Zeewolde project parental consent is required. We will typically not start the placement procedure, if not all necessary documents are submitted. Applications received at an earlier date will receive a response from 12 March or 16 April onwards. Please contact us if you need more information.

Travel arrangements

Please make sure you arrive at the day your project starts. If you arrive earlier (for example because flights are much cheaper), you will need to make your own arrangements for accommodation. If, after the project has been completed, you plan to stay longer or like to travel onwards, you also need to make your own arrangements. A later arrival or earlier departure from a project needs to be discussed and agreed upon with SIW in advance. Please also consider more sustainable ways of travelling: within Europe you can for example travel cheaply by bus and have a much lower carbon footprint (www.eurolines.com and www.global.flixbus.com). If you fly from abroad you may want to consider to join a CO2 emission scheme.

Nearest airport and train station

For most SIW international work camps Amsterdam Schiphol Airport is the nearest airport. Right under Schiphol airport is a train platform. Several budget airlines travel to/from Eindhoven Airport as well. More information about nearest terminal and meeting points will be described in the detailed info sheets. Train tickets are not to be booked in advance, but an OV chipcard needs to be purchased at railway stations. You can use this OV-chipcard to travel on all forms of public transport including trains, buses, trams and metros. Detailed information about the different kinds of OVchipcard, the costs and how to use it will be given later.

Work

The work carried out during our projects is organised by our Dutch partners. The work can vary from cutting trees and piling paths to working in a second-hand shop together with former homeless people. The volunteers will work up to 30 hours a week, having the weekends off. There is one exception: during the 'Emmaus project' volunteers will also work on Saturday, but will have a free day on a working day instead.



Leisure activities

During all projects time can be spent to explore the surroundings and more of the Netherlands. On most projects bikes are available and public transport is in the near vicinity to travel around the area. The camp leaders will propose how the project theme (see pg.10) can be elaborated and discuss this with the group. Some free time will be spent on activities related to this theme. The camp leaders will prepare some activities, but participants are expected to come up with ideas themselves as well.

Camp leaders

Typically two camp leaders of SIW supervise each project. These camp leaders will be trained by SIW to successfully organise the work camp. They carry out a large part of the practical preparatory work and arrange daily matters during the project. They will be living and working together with the participants during the project. The camp leaders also organise and lead most of the leisure activities and make sure that the participants will have a great time in the Netherlands! However, we expect the volunteers not to sit and wait until the camp leaders take action: we expect them to be proactive and to develop initiatives to take on and participate in the organisation of recreational and other activities.



Bicycles

In the Netherlands everyone rides a bicycle and so will the volunteers on all SIW's projects, except for Zonnehoeve Zeewolde. It is easy to cycle in the Netherlands due to its flat surface and for those who have never cycled before: camp leaders or other volunteers are often willing to help other volunteers to learn how to ride a bike.

Food

For breakfast and lunch Dutch people eat typically bread and sandwiches. A warm meal is typically only eaten in the evening. SIW will do its best to take dietary requirements and allergies into account, if SIW is informed in advance.

Drugs and alcohol

The fact that soft drugs are (almost) legal in The Netherlands is for some international participants a reason to enrol in Dutch work camps. It must be made clear however that SIW has adopted the rule that for <u>all</u> our work camps it is <u>strictly forbidden</u> to use drugs. Limited drinking of alcohol is allowed in the projects for those of 18+ years, as long as volunteers respect the work schedule. Note that on the Emmaus project and the Refugee Centre project in Emmen alcohol is prohibited on working days; alcoholic drinks are allowed during the weekends but only when discussed with the Emmaus staff or COA staff.

Motivation letter

For some of our projects, we ask for a motivation letter. Our social projects are very interesting and will no doubt be a special experience but they also require specific attention. We think it is important that participants make a well-considered decision to enrol in one of these work camps. Therefore, we ask for a motivation letter for these projects. Also, for some physically challenging projects we ask for a motivation letter. In their motivation letter participants can explain why they want to participate in the project, whether they have any kind of experience that can be a valuable addition to the project, what they expect from the project and what they would like to learn. Specific experience is not required to enrol in SIW projects; an open mind and attitude and a strong motivation to enrol in the project is most important. For the refugee centre project in Emmen we adopted the additional requirement that volunteers require a certificate of conduct.

Info sheets and welcome letter

At least six weeks before the project starts, the participants will receive an up-to-date information sheet about the work camp they will participate in. The info sheet contains information about the terminal and pick-up times, relevant addresses and telephone numbers, information about the work, a list of what to bring and a short introduction of the camp leaders.

Right before the start of the work camp the camp leaders will send a welcome letter to all participants in which they will introduce themselves, emphasize what participants should bring, and have the opportunity to give the latest information about the project. It will also include the details of our Trusted Person in case a volunteer would like to share a concern.

Pictures, video-clips and social media and video challenge

During most if not all projects a video challenge will be organised. A professional film maker will share tips and tricks for making a proper movie with your smartphone. For the best movie of the camp season there is of course a proper price!

SIW likes to share pictures and video-clips of the work camps through social media. If you object against sharing these, please notify your camp leader the first day. Participants are encouraged to share experiences through social media whilst taking into account the wish of colleague participants and or local volunteers who may not want to have pictures/videos shared. Please note that it is not allowed to make pictures / videos in the refugee centre in Emmen.

Participation fee

The participation fee for the work camps for those of 18+ years is 25 euro if the applicant for an Erasmus+ grant is rejected The fee was introduced when SIW faced financial difficulties. SIW is doing financially better now, but still the possibilities to cover the costs of projects through local and national grants are limited. That is why we still have to keep the participation fee in place in order to be able to organise our projects. This fee is spent on project logistics such as food, utilities and transportation. The participation fee for the Zonnehoeve Zeewolde project is 100 euro which takes into account costs for additional trained workcamp staff and proper transport to and from the camp. The fee needs to be paid on arrival, hence please make sure you have the right amount of cash money with you.

Additional funds

Participants are requested to bring sufficient funds to cover the costs of travel to and from the project location, private expenses and the costs of extra recreational activities, as these cannot be covered by the participation fee. Such extra recreational activities vary from project to project and might include e.g. a visit to a nearby town (Amsterdam, Utrecht, Groningen), a boat ride in the canals of Amsterdam or Utrecht, a visit of the open air theatre at Almere or mudwalking in the Waddenzee.

Implementation of the theme

During the 2020 international volunteering projects, SIW wants participants to connect with the United Nations' SDG's (Sustainable Development Goals). As SIW we are using the SDG's to ensure our projects make a contribution to improve the sustainability of our planate, promote peace and reduce inequalities. Six SDG's have been carefully selected matching this years' projects in the Netherlands. Participants of our camps are invited to find a creative way, such as a play/performance, song, video-clip, poetry or art out of recycling materials, to promote the targets that are part of the chosen SDG's and how people can contribute to reaching them. Thoughts and results will be shared via social media.

Aims of the theme

Peace Project SIW-2001: Refugee Centre 'Emmen' Bring a smile on the faces of children, supporting peace





Dates: 5 July - 19 July Participants: 10 Type: SOC, CULT, KIDS, REFU Age: 18+ Location: the city of Emmen, province of Drenthe, northern Netherlands Participation fee: € 25,-

Location & partner: The location of the project is the Refugee Centre Emmen. Emmen is a city of about 60.000 inhabitants in the province of Drenthe in the northern part of the Netherlands. This refugee centre (in Dutch: 'AZC Emmen') has a capacity for about 400 refugees. This particular place is a location for families with under age children whose application for asylum has been denied by the Dutch government. These families will in time return to their homeland.

Our partner is the Central Agency for the Reception of Asylum Seekers (in Dutch: COA). The COA provides accommodation during the asylum procedure and prepares asylum seekers for staying in the Netherlands, returning to their country of origin or transmigration. At the moment COA manages about 100 centres in the Netherlands. COA is an independent administrative body funded by the Dutch Ministry of Justice.

The COA works together with a partner named 'De Vrolijkheid': the National Foundation for the Promotion of Happiness. The Happiness is a multicultural, not-for-profit network of artists, play writers, actors, musicians and volunteers who invest in children and teenagers in asylum-seeking centres. The Happiness organises creative activities on a regular basis in 30 asylum-seeking centres in the Netherlands. Please note that it is not allowed to take pictures and/or make videos in the refugee centre.

Work: The project takes place in the refugee centre in Emmen which is a location for families with children. The children you will be working with are between 4 and 12 years of age. These children participate in a school program, but during the months of July and August, there is the summer holiday break. The volunteers will then organise activities for and with the children. This type of work calls for creative people who can make up all sorts of games from scratch to play with the children: music, sports, arts, language sessions, creativity, etc. Therefore the content of this project is up to you and the other participants. The games scheduled are throughout the week.



Accommodation & food: Volunteers will stay at a campsite. You will need to bring your own tent, sleeping bag and matrass. There are cooking facilities in a cooking tent and the group will cook for

themselves. The centre will provide bikes for every volunteer to ride between the campsite and the Refugee Centre (including bike ride lessons). Volunteers will bring a packed lunch to the worksite.

Leisure activities: Of course there will be sufficient free time. Together with your camp leaders you will discuss the recreational program. Emmen is an attractive city with lots of activities in the summertime. You can visit places nearby and explore the surroundings. The area is declared a UNESCO-Geopark by the United Nations. Emmen is very well accessible by train and bus. Biggest attraction is the new theme park Wildlands Adventure Zoo (opened in 2016). Leisure time will also be spent on the general theme Connecting with the Sustainable Development Goals and means to foster peace.

Environmental project SIW- 2002: State Forestry - 'Oudemolen' Working on nature preservation in a Dutch National Park





Dates: 8 - 22 August Participants: 20 Type: ENVI Age: 18+ Location: Oudemolen, province of Drenthe, northern Netherlands Participation fee: € 25,-

Location & partner: The 'Drentsche Aa' area is a varied old cultural landscape, shaped by age old interplay of agriculture and nature. The 'Drentsche Aa' is also the name of the stream that meanders through this area and creates a typical landscape that is declared National Park. It includes 16 authentic villages. The partner in this project is the Dutch State Forestry, commissioned by the Dutch government to manage a large part of the nature reserves in the Netherlands. In 2020 it will be the 13th anniversary of this project in Oudemolen, so project Oudemolen is almost part of the region's collective memory. This certainly counts for the local residents who have shown a lot of interest in the volunteers and, in some or another way, will



always be involved in the project. Volunteers can count on a warm welcome.

Work: The participants will do different activities of nature protection like cutting, dredging, pilling up the paths, haymaking and light construction work. You will also work together with other local people who do voluntary nature work. The local rangers are very supportive and looking forward to host you in their beautiful area. 'The Drentsche Aa' has been nominated most beautiful landscape of the Netherlands.

Accommodation & food: Volunteers are expected to bring their own tent, airbed or matrass and sleeping bag. You will stay at the beautiful situated private campsite of the State Forestry location Oudemolen. The group will cook for themselves in a barn that is equipped with all cooking facilities. There is one shower and one toilet. Bicycles will we provided, this will be your transportation to the various worksites.

Leisure activities: of course, the camp leaders and partner organization will encourage the volunteers to put forward their own ideas for a recreational program, but in this project it is a tradition that activities are being suggested and/or organised by State Forestry, e.g. a 'mudwalking' tour on the 'bottom' of the Wadden area; a Unesco World Heritage Site because of the world's largest area of intertidal sand and mudflats. A unique experience! Other activities during the week can be swimming, bicycling, visiting the flourishing city of Groningen or the Westerbork transit

camp (where Anne Frank was prisoned). Leisure time will also be spent on the general theme Connecting with the Sustainable Development Goals.

Social project SIW-2003: Help out former homeless people in a second-hand store





Dates: 16 August - 30 August Participants: 8 Type: SOC, FEST Age: 18+ Location: Haarzuilens, province of Utrecht, the middle of the Netherlands Participation fee: € 25,-

Location & partner: Our partner, Emmaus Haarzuilens, is situated in the small, beautiful neighbourhood of Haarzuilens. It is very close to Utrecht and to the Castle of Haarzuilens. Emmaus Haarzuilens is a community which provides home for former homeless people and others who strongly feel related to Emmaus ideology. Within the community the residents work to bring back value to second hand objects and, at the same time, build their self-esteem. All the people who live at Emmaus work at the second hand store that also includes a recycling section. The money earned by doing this work is used to finance the community and for supporting international social projects. Volunteers will not only work, but also live together with the inhabitants of Emmaus Haarzuilens. We thereby want to emphasize that living together also means preparing and eating the meals together and do some cleaning and light house work. It means that volunteers are expected to live by the rules of Emmaus; following the Emmaus philosophy and considering the background of some of the Emmaus residents, <u>use of alcohol is prohibited during working days</u>.

Work: The most important aim of the project is for volunteers to get a better understanding of Emmaus and the Emmaus philosophy. The volunteers will live and work together with the residents

of Emmaus. Because of the summer market, which will take place at the end of the project, this period of the year will be extra busy. The volunteers will help out where necessary, which can mean that some days are busier and others less so. The work will include picking up second hand goods together with the Emmaus residents and placing them in the shop. The volunteers will help with gardening and other maintenance works on the grounds of the community and they will help in the kitchen. At the end of the project the volunteers will help with the set-up and break-down of the festival and the organization of a fashion show to present the second hand clothes that are for sale. The income from this sale is fully used to support a chosen special project.



Accommodation & food: Volunteers will stay in comfortable accommodation at the Emmaus grounds. Beds are provided, but participants need to bring their own sleeping bags. They will cook and eat together with the residents of Emmaus.

Leisure activities: Together with the camp leaders the volunteers will discuss the recreational program. For example, they can explore the beautiful historical city centre of Utrecht by bike, climb the Dom Tower, go canoeing on the canals, visit a museum, or visit other places in The Netherlands. The camp leaders will have some ideas, but of course it is possible for the volunteers to put forward their own ideas for this program! Leisure time will also be spent on the general theme Connecting with the Sustainable Development Goals.

Environmental project SIW-2004: State Forestry Noard-Fryslân - 'Twijzel' Helping the rangers protecting the swamps of the Netherlands





Dates: 16 - 30 August Participants: 16 Type: ENVI Age: 18+ Location: Twijzel, province of Fryslân, northern Netherlands Participation fee: € 25,-

Location & partner: The working area of 'State Forestry Noard-Fryslân' offers a varied landscape with a rough swamp nature. It is a perfect area to walk around so you can see the various landscapes. There are a lot of little lakes here in the north of Fryslân. The partner is the Dutch State Forestry, commissioned by the Dutch government to manage a large part of the nature reserves in the Netherlands. Working towards a sustainable living environment for man, plant and animal is central to their mission. It is a social organization, working for and on behalf of society, cooperating actively with Dutch citizens and the organisations and institutions that represent them.

Work: The volunteers will work in the area surrounding Twijzel, a small village in Fryslân, known for its cultural-historic and blooming bluegrass landscapes and swamp forests. The participants will play an important role in the preservation of the flora and fauna of the area. Together with the state forest rangers the volunteers will do different activities such as cutting, dredging and maintaining the paths. Because of the unique status of the area this is work that cannot be carried out by machines. So the volunteers will play a vital role in the nature preservation. The rangers are very enthusiastic and will tell you all about the special species that live in this area. During the week they will



organise excursions and volunteers will work together with local volunteers.

Accommodation & food: Volunteers will stay either in tents or in a building. The group will do groceries and cook together for themselves. The State Forestry provides bikes for every volunteer to go back and forth from the accommodation to the worksite. Volunteers will bring a packed lunch to work and eat on the site, either outside or inside a work trailer depending on the weather.

Leisure activities: Together with the camp leaders the volunteers will discuss the recreational program. For example they can explore the area by bike, go swimming, visit a museum or other places in the Netherlands, such as Leeuwarden, a city nearby. The camp leaders will have some ideas, but of course it is possible for the volunteers to put forward their own ideas for this program!

Leisure time will also be spent on the general theme Connecting with the Sustainable Development Goals.

Agricultural project SIW-2005: Zonnehoeve Zeewolde

Participate in life on an organic farm





Dates: 1 - 15 August Participants: 12 Type: AGRI, ENVI Age: 15-17 Location: Zeewolde, province of Flevoland Participation fee: € 100,-

Location & partner: The organic farm Zonnehoeve is located near Zeewolde, a small town in the province of Flevoland. Flevoland is "new land": some 50 years ago, in 1968, this area was recovered from the Zuiderzee, a branch of the North Sea. Zonnehoeve was created in 1981. It is an exciting development in agriculture based on a closed production cycle: cattle breeding and agriculture service each other; all waste remains within the farm and is reused. The livestock of the Zonnehoeve - horse and cattle - graze on the lands of the Dutch State Forestry, the organisation commissioned by the Dutch government to manage a large part of the natural reserves in the Netherlands. In close cooperation with the State Forestry Zonnehoeve is working towards a sustainable living environment for man, plant and animal. Apart from its agriculture and cattle breeding branch the Zonnehoeve has a care branch: a living - working community for persons with

development problems. This activity is integrated in the production cycle: the participants of the care facility work on the farm and in the bakery.

Work: the volunteers will work on the farm and in the natural reserve areas around the farm. They will carry out farm tasks, such as working the land, preparing a piece of land for a new purpose, cutting trees and plants, taking part in harvest activities, repairing fences and guarding cattle. In farming, weather conditions determine to some extent what is urgent. What will be done during the project period will therefore depend on what the farm management considers necessary at the time.



Accommodation & food: the volunteers will have a common room, where they can relax, prepare food and eat. The participants can choose whether they will sleep in the common room or in a tent in a field near the common room. The extra fee takes into account costs for additional trained workcamp staff and proper transport to and from the camp. In line with Dutch laws, use of alcohol is prohibited for youngsters below 18 years.

Leisure activities: Together with the camp leaders the volunteers will discuss the recreational program. The camp leaders will have some ideas, but of course it is possible for the volunteers to put forward their own ideas for this program! Leisure time will also be spent on the general theme Connecting with the Sustainable Development Goals. The farm management is available to explain

the philosophy behind the Zonnehoeve operation. Zonnehoeve is located in the vicinity of some beautiful natural reserves. The forest rangers will be able to organise excursions into these areas. Also, the relatively new city of Almere, and of course, the city of Amsterdam offer interesting options for excursions during the weekends.
