Civic activism in Kosova - an inspiring story

Objective of the study visit

Youth workers play an essential role in empowering young people, addressing their needs, and supporting their active participation in society. Why did we choose Kosova

In Kosova over the years, civil society organizations have become increasingly active in monitoring government actions, political promises, and the implementation of policies, ensuring that they align with the public interest. This vibrant civil society landscape contributes to the strengthening of democracy and good governance in Kosova, empowering youth and citizens alike to participate in civic life.

Despite the challenges the country has faced, particularly in the aftermath of war, youth workers in Kosova have risen to the occasion by fostering civic activism among young people. Through innovative programs, youth workers in Kosova have supported youth in taking leadership roles in their communities, shaping local policies, and engaging in volunteer and community initiatives. Success stories from Kosova highlight the effectiveness of youth-led movements, youth-driven volunteer programs, and initiatives that promote youth participation in decision-making. These examples are powerful reminders of the potential of civic activism in empowering youth workers and enabling them to make a meaningful impact on young people's lives. The purpose of the visit is to share these success stories from Kosova, demonstrating how civic activism can be a powerful tool in the empowerment of youth workers. By learning from these experiences, youth workers from across Europe will gain new insights and practical strategies that can be applied to their own contexts.

The <u>V-Dem Institute</u> (Varieties of Democracy) offers a comprehensive analysis of democracy in Kosova through its annual <u>Democracy Reports</u>, In the 2024 Democracy Report, Kosova is ranked <u>62nd</u> out of 179 countries on the <u>Liberal Democracy Index</u>, with a score of 0.49. This positions Kosova as the highest-ranked country in the Western Balkans, ahead of Montenegro and North Macedonia. The Liberal Democracy Index assesses the quality of democracy by evaluating factors such as <u>electoral democracy</u>, <u>political pluralism</u>, <u>civil liberties</u>, and <u>functioning of government</u>. Kosova's relatively high ranking indicates a strong commitment to democratic principles, though there is room for improvement in areas like political pluralism and civil liberties. This Study visit is organised with Erasmus+ funding (Youth workers mobilities). Project is organised with 2024 funding shceme and travel support will be paid according to the Erasmus+ distance band.

Travel grants are paid according to the funding rules of Erasmus+: Travel grants depend on the length of the journey, and for measurement of the journey we use Erasmus+ distance band calculator: https://ec.europa.eu/programmes/erasmus-plus/resources/distance-calculator_en.

We also recommend to consider travelling sustainably if you have the possibility. Green travel means that you will travel over 50% of the journey by using sustainable options (train, bus, carpooling).

Travel grant is paid only after the seminar and after the participant has filled in the EU-survey and given all the needed travelling documents (travel tickets, boarding passes, invoices).

Kosovo and its inhabitants

Republic of Kosova is a country in the South-east region of Europe with its capital city Prishtina. Kosova's history dates back to the 4th century BCE when it was known as Kingdom of Dardania. It's journey culminated on 17th of February 2008 when it declared independence from Yugoslavia and today is known as the youngest country in Europe and its people as Young Europeans due to having the youngest population in Europe with 50% being youth. A vibrant country and a people known for hospitality, positive vibes and humbleness.

Kosovo is a multiethnic society with a rich cultural mosaic. The primary ethnic groups living in Kosovo include: Albanians (the majority 90% of the population, followed by Serbs, Bosniaks, Turks, Roma, Ashkali, and Egyptians (RAE communities), Gorani, Croats and Montenegrins.

Important Info

If you enter Kosovo first and want to travel to Serbia, they will not allow you. The only option is to either enter Serbia via N.Macedonia OR enter Serbia first and then you will be allowed to enter Kosova.

Important info: As Kosova is not a member of the Schengen Area nor a member of the European Union you may not be able to enter without a Passport. So, please bring it with you.

Recommendations

We are excited for your visit to our country and can't miss on providing suggestions in terms of what to visit and make yours as smooth and memorable as possible.

Our country is known for mountain, cultural and medical tourism. This is for tourists of course, because we prefer to party, dance, cheer and chill - which is why we got known for the best nightlife in Southeast Europe with clubs and bars offering a variety of moods from techno to folk, you find it all in Kosova.

So, if you plan to use the two extra days for visiting Kosova we recommend you go outside Prishtina, because we will be visiting it during our training days. Kosova is small, Prishtina even smaller, so in one week you can visit it through and through.

If you are into hiking and beautiful mountains, we recommend you visit Peja. This is the birthplace of world-famous stars such as Majlinda Kelmendi - world champion in Judo, Rita Ora, Dua Lipa and many others. If there is something in the air or water which makes these people successful, this is your chance. You also have the chance to visit cultural parts, take a trip to the Rugova Mountains, or simply enjoy the amazing city of Peja, its food, coffee and great air.

If you are into historic-cultural tourism we recommend you Prizren the cultural capital of Kosova. This is a city where Turks and Bosniaks are second ethnic majority groups after Albanians being first, so it means great kebap, traditional food and alcohol. You can visit Prizren's castle, which is more than 2000 years old. A coffee by the Lumbardhi river is truly a memory.

Either in Peja or Prizren, you can take a 1h ride bus to Gjakova which offers a unique cultural experience as well. So let's say you visit Gjakova in the morning, you can have lunch there, take a bus and go back to Prizren/Peja.

If you are into wine, from Prizren you can take a bus to Suhareka or Rahovec and enjoy wine tours from vineries in these cities and sip among the vineyards.

1. Newborn Monument

2. House of Independence

3. Museum of Children Victims of the War

Travel information

BY FLIGHT

Prishtina's International Airport is well connected with many European Airports, offering even direct lines from certain airports. If you need cheaper flights, you may consider Tirana International Airport or Skopje International Airport. Skopje is 2h away from Prishtina and a bus ticket from Airport will cost you around 10€ total one way. Tirana is 4h away and one way bus ticket costs 15€. From Skopje Airport you should take the airport bus to Skopje Central Station bus, and from there to Prishtina.


The buses travel from Tirana to Prishtina and it doesn't have a bus station at the airport, but at a nearby location. Link of the pickup location is here:

TO THE HOTEL

From Prishtina International Airport:

Once you leave the arrival doors of the airport, the bus station will be on your left - marked 1A. Bus leaves every 2 hours with it's first departure being 08:00 and the ticket costs 3€ Find the schedule here:



If you arrive after 00:00 the only option to reach Prishtina is by taxi. Price range is public and visible upon exit of the airport. Prishtina's taxi companies offer prices as low as 15€ to city center.

You will be provided with the exact bus stop before arrival.

IF YOU CAN'T WALK

We will provide you with information on how to get to the hotel as soon as the booking is finalized.

FROM TIRANA OR SKOPJE

If you arrive from Skopje or Tirana, you will stop at Prishtina Central Bus Station. From there we recommend you to walk directly to the hotel. If you for whatever reason can't walk follow these steps:

Session by Kosova Democratic Institute (KDI)

This session will discuss the role of democratic institutions in Kosova and their contributions to civic activism, focusing on Kosova's democratic progress and transparency.

Visit to LEVIZJA FOL

LEVIZJA FOL will discuss the importance of monitoring and evaluation in civil society projects, and their efforts to promote transparency and accountability in Kosova.

Visit to Kosova Women's Network

The visit will showcase the Kosova Women's Network's work advocating for gender equality and empowering women, focusing on women's rights and social inclusion.

Visit to the Parliament of Kosova

This visit will explore the Youth and Women's Caucus, discussing legislative efforts to empower youth and women and increase their political participation.

Visit to Balkan Investigative Reporting Network (BIRN)

BIRN will discuss investigative journalism's role in strengthening democracy in Kosova, covering the importance of media freedom and government accountability.

Panel Discussion: Living in a Diverse Kosova - Does Multiethnicity Work?

A panel featuring speakers from NGOs working with minority communities in Kosova, discussing multiethnic coexistence and the role of civil society in promoting inclusivity.

Field Visit: Prizren - Cultural Capital City of Kosova

Participants will visit Prizren to learn how civic activism helps protect cultural heritage and promote inclusivity, focusing on the city's history and cultural significance.

General information

ACCOMMODATION

You will get the information on your accommodation as soon as the booking is finalized.

CURRENCY

EURO is the official currency in Kosova. If you need to exchange money, we recommend you do it at the airport or at a bank. You won't find many exchange offices in Prishtina.

ELECTRICITY

In Kosovo, power plugs and sockets (outlets) of type F are used. The standard voltage is 230 V at a frequency of 50 Hz.
